

Spay/Neuter Post-Operative Instructions

Provided by SBPA (Spay/Neuter Program for Animals)

Thank you for being part of the solution to animal overpopulation! Your pet has undergone a sterilization surgery today. Please follow these instructions carefully for a safe and healthy recovery. We understand in the case of street dogs/cats and strays, following these instructions may not be practical. Any recommended post-op care that may be provided is helpful for a successful recovery for the animal.

1. General Care

- Keep your pet **indoors** and **warm** tonight. Anesthesia lowers body temperature and coordination.
- Limit activity for **7–10 days**. No running, jumping, or rough play.
- Use a leash when taking your dog outside. For cats, keep them confined to a small room or carrier if needed.

2. Incision Site

- Do not bathe your pet or allow swimming for 10 days.
- Check the incision **twice daily**. A small amount of redness or swelling is normal.
- Do not apply ointment or hydrogen peroxide—this can slow healing.
- Call a vet if you see:
 - Severe swelling or redness
 - Discharge (pus or blood)
 - Open or gaping incision
 - Persistent licking or chewing at the area
- or; if these issues present themselves on the day of the clinic, return the animal to the clinic for follow up treatment as soon as possible.

3. Prevent Licking

- If your pet tries to lick the incision, use an e-collar (cone) or recovery suit.
- Licking can lead to infection or cause the incision to open.

4. Food & Water

- Offer a small amount of food and water this evening.
- Your pet may have a reduced appetite for 24 hours due to anesthesia.
- If vomiting, withhold food until morning and offer a small bland meal.

5. Pain Management

- Your pet received a pain injection today.
- Do not give human pain medications many are toxic to pets.
- Contact your vet if your pet seems very uncomfortable after 24 hours. If clinic is open the next day (Saturday clinics), bring your animal back for evaluation.

6. Monitor Behavior

- Mild grogginess or shivering after surgery is normal.
- Contact a veterinarian if your pet shows:
 - Difficulty breathing
 - o Pale gums
 - Collapse or unresponsiveness
 - Refusal to eat or drink after 24 hours



7. Stitches

Most incisions have dissolvable sutures and do not need to be removed.
